"No Excuses, No Stopping" Luke 4:

What things do you experience, see cause you to step back and say, "wow?"

In Luke's gospel, Luke focusses on the power and authority of Jesus as given to him through God's Spirit. Luke will hold up illustrations of Jesus' supremacy over nature, people and evil forces to teach a non-Jewish audience what is it that sets Jesus apart from other teachers.

Luke 4 starts with Jesus back in his hometown. He reads from Isaiah 61, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me." Read through *Luke 4:18, 19* and jot down all the things Jesus has been anointed and appointed to do. How does the compare to the call God places on each of our lives?

Jesus is not received well by those who knew him best, so he moves on to Capernaum. The home of Peter, Andrew, James and John.

Read Luke 4:31,32. How is Jesus received here compared to his hometown? How are we received by those who know us, and those who don't? What amazes me about Jesus?

Read *Hebrews 12:28* and *Daniel 7:18*. How do these verses encourage me to keep moving forward in spite of opposition I may face?
