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Isaiah speaks to King Ahaz at a moment of fear and political crisis.

"The Lord Himself will give you a sign: the virgin will conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel."

Why does God use a child as the sign?

A. God's Wonder Often Arrives Where We Least Expect It

God gives a sign not in the palace... not on the battlefield... not through armies or strategies... ...but through a child.

God's answer to overwhelming fear was overwhelming grace.
